It wasn't until high school that I met my first Latina teacher, Mrs. Gonzalez. I still remember her words: "Just because you speak with an accent doesn't mean you think with an accent."

She taught me it was okay to straddle two cultures, two languages, and combine them into one identity.

Regardless of how we got here, we are just trying to live. To feed our families. To give our kids the opportunity for a better life.
